





Breaking news!



For a limited time, this financial aid has lowered its minimum age eligibility to 21. You may qualify if:

- 1. You're at least 21
- 2. You've lived in Michigan for at least one year
- You've earned a high school diploma or equivalent or certificate of completion
- You have not yet completed any college degrees

As short while ago, Carmen Samaniego felt limited by life. A single mother of two, she had left the hair salon where she worked as a stylist to start her own shop. Almost immediately, COVID-19 and the shutdowns that came with it kicked in. She was without income and options.

"I was scared," Samaniego explains.
"Then, a friend told me about the
Reconnect program. I had never
heard anything like that before.
It didn't sound right to just go to
college for free. But I looked into it,
applied for it and began going to
college for free."

The Michigan Reconnect Program provides free in-district tuition at an in-state community college to earn an associate degree or Pell-eligible skill certificate. As of October 2023, the eligibility age has been lowered to 21 until November 2024.

She also has begun the process of transferring to the University of Michigan's School of Information (UMSI) where she plans to earn a bachelors degree.

As a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) scholar, she not only enjoys constant counseling throughout the transfer process, Samaniego also has access to extraordinary opportunities like two NASA programs she participated in during Summer 2023.

And remember, she has demands that keep some people like her from accepting the challenges of personal improvement via education and the constant demands life makes on her.

"The nice thing about Reconnect is that they've tailored it for people in all sorts of situations. Parents. Adults with jobs," she says.

Business Management Transfer

David Graham was in his mid-40s and parenting multiple children when he enrolled at WCC. The regional manager of a national auto parts chain enjoyed his career, but something was driving him to finish his college degree.

"I'm looking to transition to a training role, talking with C-suite folks or those out in the field.
One of the things I've most enjoyed in management is teaching and explaining and showing," Graham said.

David chose the Associate Degree in Business Administration Transfer program, which offered a number of self-paced classes. He continued managing 12 stores and 130 employees while working toward his goal of completing the program and transferring to Central Michigan University to pursue a bachelor's degree in Business Management.

"I love working with the teams in the stores and working with the general public—customer service is second nature to me," said David. "But I could have a much greater impact within an organization training and helping people to develop and serve."

WCC helped David find the right path to complete his goal without sacrificing work obligations or family time.

Paying for college

WCC has one of the lowest tuition rates in Michigan, but we understand finances may still be a concern and applying for financial aid can seem complicated.

We can also help you find scholarships, like the Michigan Reconnect Scholarship (currently available to eligible adults 21 and older) and other scholarships and grants that may significantly reduce the cost of college.

Paying for textbooks

We know the cost of books and supplies can add up quickly. Some grants and scholarships may cover or—partially cover—textbook costs.

Academic Advising and Financial Aid can help you identify these options.

WCC also offers open educational resources (OERs) to help reduce costs and ensure access to materials. OERs include materials created by faculty from their own learning modules. Some faculty source OERs from learning and research that have been released and distributed in the public domain. OERs include digital and other formats and help keep education affordable while ensuring access to up-to-date materials.



Childcare

Students with children can apply for a scholarship that helps pay for child care. These are awarded through the **Student Resource Center** and can be used to pay for licensed providers. Our Student Resource team is happy to discuss requirements and help with the application process.

Life Resources

We understand that college won't be the only thing in your life. Our students face many challenges, both minor and significant. WCC has resources to help you manage.

Mental health support–WCC has a team of licensed professional

counselors that can help you work with personal issues. We also have support groups and meetings for those dealing with addiction issues.

Food insecurity—Need emergency food or financial assistance? Our Student Resource Center can help. We operate an Emergency Food Pantry and can connect you with community organizations.

Personal finances—Our team can help you learn financial planning skills and help find potential sources to assist with the cost of tuition, books, childcare and more. It's natural to be nervous when starting something new. Some worries we hear include:

- ▶ Will I be the oldest one in my class?
- ▶ I haven't been in school for a long time—I might not be able to keep up.
- ▶ I don't think I have the qualifications to enroll in my chosen program.
- ▶ I heard this is a good job, but I don't have any experience in that field.

Good news! WCC has solutions.

WCC is a great place to grow.

WCC's Student Success Team provides assistance to guide and support you.

The WCC Welcome Team helps with day-to-day questions about items, including admissions, registration (adding/dropping classes), transcripts and more.

Our Academic Advising Team can help you avoid overloading yourself by showing you not only which classes to take and when to take them, but also how to navigate transfer requirements. They can point you in the right direction if you need study help from resource centers on campus or online. This is especially valuable if you need assistance getting something over the finish line.

Degree-seeking students are assigned a Success Coach during their first year at WCC. They provide one-on-one support to identify and handle obstacles, connect you to campus services and resources, and work with you to develop goals.



Our smaller class sizes make it easy to get to know your instructors who serve as Faculty Mentors. They are available to answer your questions about assignments, timelines and resources that help you plan. You will have support!

The WCC Center for Career Success is here to help you find a job, internship or co-op experience. It's a great way to connect with potential employers, as well. We also provide résumé and cover letter assistance, interview coaching and professional development advice.



Michigan Reconnect was the spark that Amanda MacDonald, a wife and mother of three, needed to fulfill her career aspirations.

Launched in February 2021, Reconnect pays the cost of in-district tuition for eligible adults (currently 21 and older) wanting to pursue an Associate Degree or skills certificate at any of Michigan's public community colleges. According to the state, more than 12,000 scholarship participants are currently benefitting from the program.

Amanda chose to pursue a Medical Billing and Coding Certificate. She wants to apply her credits to an Associate Degree in Health Administration.


She hopes to help people navigate through complicated insurance cases and advocate for coverage.

"Enrolling in college was always in the back of my mind but was not something I was necessarily planning," Amanda said.

ow do I get started?

Does WCC sound like the right place for you? Follow these steps to start your journey toward a high-quality, affordable education and a welcoming campus community.



Step 1: Apply to WCC

Applying is quick, easy, and free—we don't charge for applications. Visit wccnet.edu/enroll to start the process. If you have questions, contact us at 734-973-3543.

Sounds great, but I don't live in Washtenaw County

WCC is convenient to several neighboring counties, and since we have one of the lowest tuition rates in Michigan, even out-of-district (and out-of-state!) rates are competitive. Compare college costs and calculate savings by using the Tuition Savings Calculator under the "Afford" section on wccnet.edu.

More good news! If you work in Washtenaw County but don't live here, you might still qualify for in-district tuition rates. This also might apply if you own property in Washtenaw County. Approval requires advance planning, and our team is happy to answer questions and help you through the process.

Step 2: Apply for Financial Aid We recommend that all students complete the FAFSA/financial aid application using WCC's Federal School Code, which is 002328.

You'll need this to qualify for scholarships (including the Michigan Reconnect program) and additional financial aid. Contact our team by phone, email or online chat to get help with this application.

Step 3. Identify your goal. Are you:

- Attending college for the first time?
- ► Hoping to obtain a degree or certificate?
- Working toward transferring to a four-year university?
- Looking to change careers?
- Looking to advance in your current career?

Looking to complete a degree you started?

Defining your goal goes a long way toward meeting it. Our Student Welcome Center provides advice and assistance to make sure you set off down the right path. We'll connect you with an academic advisor and make sure any prerequisite, degree or transfer requirements are covered.

Step 4: Register for classes

Visit wccnet.edu/enroll to view classes for current and upcoming semesters and plan your schedule.

Course schedules are available several weeks before registration for each semester, so you'll have plenty of time to plan. Academic advisors are here to help if you need assistance selecting classes to meet your goals.
