Program, a federal TRiO program, which prepares first-generation students for doctoral studies.

If you're human, you're biased. Implicit bias is the result of a variety of messages introduced into our subconscious from an early age. Many of these biases are deep in our unconscious and often influence how we perceive others. Biases are not restricted to any one group, and all of us have them.

This interactive 2-hour workshop will help you understand the origin of biases and how they may impact classroom dynamics, perceptions and interactions by covering the following objectives:
