



It is designed for anyone in the community to use, to recognize the warning signs that someone might be thinking about suicide, and have a conversation with the person at risk and get them to someone who can help them further, like a mental health professional. As many of you know, there are sometimes conversations with someone and you have a "gut feeling" that they're struggling more than they're saying. It's hard to know what to say, and whether or not you should ask them directly about suicide. QPR is specifically about these types of conversations. It will give you the skills to feel more confident in those conversations. What you will learn: How to recognize early warning signs that someone may be thinking about suicide Words and phrases to say to offer support and hope How to connect them to someone who can assess their safety and make a plan to keep them safe
