New Welding 3+1

There aren't many ways for welding students to put their unique skillset toward a four-year degree, but such an opportunity became available when the WCC Board of Trustees approved a new 3+1 agreement with Wayne State University at its November meeting. Students complete a Welding Technology associate degree, some electrical and advanced math courses, and all general education credits at WCC before completing a bachelor's degree in Metallurgical Engineering Technology at Wayne State.

FUN FACT

The new partnership with Wayne State brings the total number of 3+1 articulation agreements WCC has with four-year universities to **50**. Completing three years' worth of credits at WCC's low tuition rate saves students thousands of dollars.
